




The Greatest Tennis Season in WA History

Newly renovated tennis courts at the Academy, a gift from a WA family who sought to enhance the tennis program and the school, set the backdrop for the greatest boys tennis season in school history. The team's remarkable accomplishments included an undefeated team record, numerous team and individual championships, a repeat conference championship, only its second Sectional championship of all time, and six state qualifiers for the first time in its history. Securing a State result that would be a fitting final chapter of a storybook season was hard to imagine. However, just

as they had done all season, the Warriors once again exceeded all expectations by closing the book on the 2018 season with the most State wins (17) of any 1A team in a State Finals tournament. The Academy was also the only Class 1A team receiving All-State honors by all six of its state qualifiers (Ty Krill '18, Owen Setran '19, Devin Greeno '20, Tristan Hilson '20, Graham Shelton '20, and Jacob Williams '21). Did we mention the Warriors also came away from State with a 4th place trophy in the final team standings? It was truly a season dedicated to God's glory. Soli Deo Gloria.

Thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor, this year's spring Instrumental Concert featured "conductor-in-residence" Rick Westerfield, a nationally-renowned orchestra conductor (and husband of WA's Helen Westerfield). Mr. Westerfield spent several rehearsals working with the orchestra on the *Holberg Suite*, which he conducted in the concert. In addition, Mr. Westerfield tutored WA junior Will Lyon in conducting this past semester, and Will conducted *Rhosymedre* as part of his study with Mr. Westerfield. Will is a highly ranked ILMEA All-State cellist and an aspiring conductor. This special evening of music also included the WA band, jazz band, and percussion ensemble.

Having the opportunity to work under the direction of such a gifted man was a special privilege for our students. Rick has led many of the world's finest orchestras, appearing throughout the U.S. and Canada, Germany, France, Great Britain, Finland, Japan, Australia and New Zealand. A student and protégé of Leonard Bernstein, Rick was appointed assistant conductor of the Boston Symphony by Seiji Ozawa in 1995 and associate conductor shortly thereafter. Rick has served on the music faculty at Brown University, and as music director of the Alabama Symphony Orchestra. Together with his wife Helen, he was music minister at New York's Redeemer Presbyterian Church under Tim Keller. Rick holds two degrees from Yale and is a former Fulbright Scholar.

The Hillers have had a lasting impact on the Academy. Will served on the Wheaton Academy Board of Trustees for four years from 1971 until his death in 1975. Ruth Ann then served from 1975 to 1976. The Hillers' Board service gave them unique insight into the sacrifice and dedication of the Academy's faculty who willingly and lovingly mold the characters of their students year after year.

In 1976, the family and friends of Will Hiller established the Wilbur A. Hiller Memorial Teaching Award to carry on his dream to stimulate and encourage teaching excellence. The recipient of this annual "Teacher of the Year" award is selected by the faculty and students based on the following qualities:

- The consistent exhibition of Christian graces, integrity, and service.
- Knowledge and competence in their field.
- Dedication to the profession of teaching and the ability to inspire students toward higher academic achievement and the display of Christian virtues.
- Sensitivity and concern toward students as people in a changing world and society.
- The willingness to offer time and talents to this school outside the classroom responsibilities.

Ruth Ann and her family have faithfully carried on the tradition of this award since its inception. On February 16 of this year, Ruth Ann was reunited with Will in heaven. She is survived by her three daughters and two grandsons: Betsy Hiller '71, Laurie Hiller '75, and Sarah (Hiller) Anderson.

Protecting the Soul of Wheaton Academy

Steve Bult named as Academy's new Head of School

The “Soul of the Academy” was the title of 37th Head of School David Roth’s 2006 Wheaton Academy Commencement address. He explained the importance of protecting the soul of any Christian school since it is the means God uses to disciple future leaders, to “raise up men and women who glorify God with their lives” by using God’s power rather than their own.



He defined the Soul of Wheaton Academy using several questions, with the last ones related to the head of school: “Does the head of school really seek to conduct the affairs of Wheaton Academy according to God’s will? Is he or she a biblical leader? When the eyes of the Lord move to and fro through the earth, will God find at the helm of Wheaton Academy a man or woman whose heart is fully His?”

When Gene Frost became the 38th head of school, David Roth gave him two small cards. One card includes the questions that define the Soul of the Academy. The other card lists five goals of the Academy’s head of school. Frost has carried these two cards in his wallet ever since.

And he has likewise carried the “Soul of the Academy” as his commitment for the past twelve years, leading to radical changes in the physical footprint of the campus, enhanced relationships with alumni, and tireless efforts to leave the school poised for progress. Frost sees Steve Bult as a significant part of that progress.

When Steve Bult is installed as the 39th Head of School, Gene Frost and David Roth together will pass those two cards on to him as a symbol of their confidence that he will faithfully fulfill his responsibility to protect the Soul of the Academy.

Wheaton Academy Board Chairman Steve Pearson explained that the plan for this succession of leadership has been in process for the past two years. Pearson expressed the Board's appreciation for the gifts and contributions of both men: "We are extremely grateful for Gene's past leadership and for his continued work that will so greatly benefit the Academy and Christian education around the world. We are equally thankful for the godly provision of such a gifted leader as Steve Bult, who both knows and loves this school and has the strengths needed to lead the Academy forward in its important mission."

More than twelve years ago when Steve Bult first encountered Wheaton Academy, his response—"I want to be part of this"—indicated his affinity for the mission of the school, and his twelve years as principal have demonstrated his understanding of the "Soul of the Academy." That understanding has framed the educational innovations and driven the initiatives for excellence over the last decade. Innovations—such as the Professional Learning Community philosophy that creates time and space for faculty teamwork and collaboration; an expanded Project

LEAD, including Project IX that pairs freshmen with upper classmen in mentoring relationships; and the Living Curriculum Teacher Development Model™ that allows the Academy to pay teachers based on performance—all were implemented under Steve’s leadership. His most recent initiative is a focus on the Kingdom Community, fueled by his desire for the Wheaton Academy community to look increasingly like the community described in Revelation 7, with every tribe, nation, and people joined together in worshiping God.

That hope for Kingdom Community extends to Bult’s desire to continue to share Wheaton Academy’s work with the world: “We’ve been so blessed for almost thirty years with growth and expansion, and the Academy is committed to impacting Christian education around the world, whether that’s through sending students out, sending faculty out, sharing best practices, bringing international students here—using whatever avenues present themselves.”

Bult views Gene Frost’s confidence in his leadership ability as high praise, especially coming from a man who, in Steve Bult’s words, “bleeds maroon.” That confidence is allowing Frost himself to move into his new role as the Executive Director of the WA Foundation and to continue to serve the school through the relationships he has formed in over 50 years of involvement with the Academy as a student, teacher, member of the board of trustees, parent, and head of school. Frost will also increase his work with the WA Institute, sharing the best practices developed at the Academy with the broader Christian school community and doing more speaking and writing.

As both Steve Bult and Gene Frost move into new roles, change at the Academy this year is inevitable, but much will stay the same. After all, says Bult, “No matter what role he’s in, Gene will always be a Warrior.” And, as Frost says, “Steve Bult has been and will continue to be a part of shepherding the mission of the Academy for future generations of students.”

The Soul and the mission—the most important parts of Wheaton Academy: these will not change.

The Means to an End

In the fall of 2015, *Let There Be Light: Wheaton Academy's Science & Technology Initiative* set forth to raise \$9.2M in an effort to provide the resources necessary to implement the Academy's science, technology, and engineering MASTER curriculum as well as fund the design and construction of the 24,750 square foot state-of-the-art Science & Technology Center. As we find ourselves in the final month of this three-year campaign, we have much for which to be thankful: six new science classrooms, each with fully equipped lab space; four additional research labs; an outdoor classroom; and the *Idea Lab* containing nine 3D printers, two router CNC machines, and two laser

CNC machines. We are also incredibly thankful for you, our WA family and friends, who have generously furnished the gifts necessary to provide for this vision.

Let There Be Light. The theme of light, as it pertains to the campaign, reminds us that while generous givers, state-of-the-art facilities, and innovative curriculum are all rich blessings, they are the means but not the end. As we seek to illuminate the minds of our students with God's Truth, our prayer is that they, in turn, will shine that *light* of Truth into "all the world."

We are also incredibly thankful for you, our WA family and friends.

As we celebrate the completion of the campaign and the benevolence of so many who have generously given in order to get us across the finish line, we would be remiss if we did not also celebrate the lives that have been, and will continue to be, changed by these gifts. Hundreds and hundreds of young believers will be better equipped to bring a biblical worldview to the fields of science, technology, and engineering.

Jesus challenges us to "go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15). Each and every day we aim to prepare each and every student to leave Wheaton Academy equipped to *let their lives shine before men* (Matthew 5:16). Beautiful facilities such as the Fine Arts Center, the Heritage Field House, and the Science & Technology Center are simply the means to that end. To God Be the Glory!

The Froese Scholarship, awarded in memory of Chase, is given each May to two WA seniors who exemplify many of the qualities Chase possessed: an adventurous spirit, intentional relationships, and a deep love for Jesus Christ. This year's recipients, Tyler Cairncross and Maggie Bailey, were honored during chapel on May 15. The chapel theme, Celebrating Life, not only focused on celebrating Chase and her impact on the WA community, but also challenged students to reflect on the impact of their own lives on those around them and encouraged them to embrace life as Chase did. "One of the attributes I admired most in Chase was her sense of wonder," shared brother, Lane. "Chase had a way of embracing life and not taking it for granted." We are grateful for the opportunity to recognize these qualities in our current students and to honor Chase's memory.

Consummate Author and Adventurer

Roy Snell (graduation year 1906) did not marry until he was over forty, so his granddaughter Teri Power's memories of him are as an elderly man who was "a little gruff." "He wasn't a kid person, more self-contained," she said. Teri, who lived several states away from her grandparents, met him only a few times, but he regularly sent her books at Christmas—most of them books he had written.

"I remember reading his mystery series for girls, but I wasn't interested in the boys' series at that age," Teri said. The fact that her grandfather had written children's books—a lot of them—was not talked about much. "It wasn't a big deal for my dad and uncles. For them it was just, 'That's what my dad did.' It was downplayed."

But the more Teri learned about her grandfather, the more she was amazed. "His was not a typical life! He went on walrus hunts and drove a dog team! I wanted to find out as much as I could about him." Her interest was also piqued by their shared interest in art. Teri, an artist who taught art for many years, has some of Roy's drawings.

She began her research with her own mother, Roy's daughter-in-law. "My mother got along beautifully with him. She would tease him, and they would spend hours talking. My earliest information came from

her, and some of my insight into him came from his books. He never wrote a memoir or autobiography, but he included a lot of his experiences, attitudes, and beliefs in his books." Teri also learned about Roy and his family through a diary kept by Roy's older brother, John. Teri typed up the daily entries, which cover a year and a half beginning July 1, 1897, and ending on December 31, 1898. She added notes and pictures from her research about family members and the surrounding community and had the document printed.

Teri has been interested in her family history as long as she can remember, but since her retirement from teaching, she has spent more time researching Roy Snell's life. She has also pursued her art more.

Teri pieced together Snell's story. He was born in 1878 in Missouri, and his family moved the next year, settling in Mayfield Township in DeKalb County in northern Illinois. He went to Wheaton Academy when he was 19 and worked as a farmhand and janitor to pay his way through both the Academy and Wheaton College. Every winter Roy and his three siblings moved to Wheaton to attend school. All four—



two brothers and two sisters—went to Wheaton College. From early on, Roy wanted to be a writer, but John, his brother, told him he needed some experiences to write about. “This, I think,” said Teri, “was a defining moment for him.”


John’s desire was to be a pastor, and when John died early in his twenties in his first pastorate, Roy took up John’s journey, attending seminary and then serving as the pastor of a small rural church in Illinois. Then, he became a principal at a school in the hills of Kentucky, teaching the children of feuding families. “It was a constant struggle to see who would take over the school—the big boys or me,” Snell reported in an interview in 1941, “and a person could just as likely get shot as not there.”

Snell’s adventures had begun, and he was gaining the experiences his brother had told him he needed to be a writer. He spent a year in Alaska as a missionary in charge of a school there, and with the Eskimos (as they were then known), he superintended a herd of 2,500 reindeer. He sailed from Prince of Wales to Russia in the Bering Sea in a boat made of walrus skins, taught school near Spokane, and also ran a confectionary there. During World War I, he served in France with the Y.M.C.A.

In the midst of all this, he was sending stories to periodicals, and many were published. In 1916 he received his Bachelor of Divinity from Chicago Theological Seminary with *The Religion of the Eskimo* as his thesis. That same year he published his first book, *Little White Fox and His Arctic Friends*, for \$6.24. This was the beginning of a prolific career: Snell often produced 2,000 words per hour; he wrote under several pseudonyms; and he eventually published nearly 90 novels for young people. He even wrote a book while he and his wife, Lucille, whom he met at the University of Chicago, were on their honeymoon.

After the war, Snell settled in Wheaton and continued to write. Many of his novels were first serialized in popular magazines for boys, and during World War II, he was chosen to write for the well-known radio show, *Jack Armstrong, the All-American Boy*, when its first writer went to war. He also wrote around a thousand Sunday School stories for the David C. Cook Publishing Company, started by the father of his college classmate, David M. Cook.

His adventures, though far tamer than before his marriage, also continued. For twenty years during the Christmas season, he worked at

Marshall Field’s and Carson’s in Chicago, selling his own books to customers who did not know he was the author. He spoke in classrooms and lecture halls, and he spent summers with his family at a cottage in Isle Royale, Michigan, a place Teri and her children, as well as the other grandchildren and great-grandchildren, continue to visit. When he died in 1959, he had published 88 books that sold more than two million copies.

Teri continues her quest to learn more about her grandfather and to share the story of his life with others. She recently had some of his books republished and has plans to create a Wikipedia page about him. “Traditionally in genealogy you have three dates—birth, marriage, and death—but so much life happens in between. I want to know what happened in Roy’s life. I want to know about his characteristics and habits—and what motivated him to write all his books.”

One of Teri’s searches turned up the thesis Snell wrote while at the University of Chicago. It is titled *The Moral Significance of Children’s Reading*. Roy was fond of saying “I am contemplating the reality of the absolute.” Teri explained, “We think he picked this phrase up during his year at Harvard and this idea greatly influenced his writing of children’s books. He was shaping children morally, helping them to pursue the ‘reality of the absolute.’ I used to wonder if Roy was a writer who had adventures to fuel his writing or if he was an adventurer who then decided to write about his adventures. I have come to believe he always had things he wanted to convey, but he needed the adventures in order to do that. I’m glad to be able to pass Roy’s legacy on to my children and grandchildren. It is important to know where you come from and how people influence you with their integrity.”

Thanks to Teri and others, Roy Snell’s influence is still being felt today.

A complete set of Roy Snell’s books is located at Dartmouth University, where his son, Laurie, was a mathematics professor for more than forty years.


Dr. Peter Payne '68

Dr. Peter Payne '68 is the managing director of the Institute for Credible Christianity (ICC). His life has been dedicated to speaking and training in apologetics and outreach as well as to serving students.

Peter entered Stanford University after graduating from the Academy. While at Stanford, he began a two-decade-long relationship with InterVarsity (then called Stanford Christian Fellowship). During a yearlong break from his studies, Peter reached the pivotal decision to major in philosophy.

After his graduation from Stanford, Peter joined the InterVarsity (IV) staff, spending the next five years serving with IV at various colleges, including Stanford. During this period, Peter met his wife Janet who was an IV student leader.

In late 1978, Peter and Janet moved to Mexico City to start a Christian student group at a local Jesuit university. Peter also began an M.A. program in philosophy, preparing for a long-term ministry



in Latin America. However, Peter began to realize that focusing his ministry plans in the U.S. or Europe made more sense. So, the family returned to California where Peter started a Ph.D. program in philosophy at Claremont Graduate School.

Peter rejoined the IV ministry staff at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor in 1991. Eventually, Peter took four months off to finish his dissertation, "Design in the Universe: The Design Argument from the Perspective of Natural Law." The lengthy process of completing his dissertation prepared him to interact in a much deeper way with science and faith questions.

While at Ann Arbor, Peter launched a series of open-air philosophy/Christianity talks on the plaza at the center of the campus. He titled his talks "Intelligent Christianity #101." Working through thoughts on a variety of topics and then

improving upon them in successive iterations over the next six years resulted in an increasing number of speaking engagements for Peter.

In 2000, Peter and Janet participated in an all-Europe IFES (International Fellowship of Evangelical Students) student conference. With the exception of two years, the Paynes have returned to Europe every year since then.

The couple moved back to California in 2007 to help care for Peter's younger brother Jim who is disabled. They started a graduate student fellowship at UCSC and launched Institute for Credible Christianity. In addition, they have continued their trips to Europe and their service to local churches in the U.S.

2018 RICHARD HOLT SCIENCE AWARD



Dr. Dwight "Kip" Streit '68

The Richard Holt Science Award, inaugurated in 2017 in conjunction with the completion of the Academy's Science & Technology Center, is given to WA alumni for their exemplary accomplishments in the field of science. The intent is to recognize and honor the scientists of the past in order to encourage and inspire the scientists of the future.

The 2018 recipient of this award is Dr. Dwight Streit '68 who shares some extraordinary coincidental career intersections with Dick Holt '52, the award's namesake. Both of these men worked with NASA and for TRW, an aerospace company. Dwight was a TRW Technical Fellow (the highest technical position in the company), a TRW Space & Electronics vice president, and president of Velocium, a TRW company. Additionally, he was inducted into the NASA Space Foundation Technology Hall of Fame in 2003.

Interestingly enough, Dwight also has a China connection. He was one of two Americans inducted in 2016 as a Distinguished Foreign Expert in China's Thousand Talents program. Initiated in 2008, this program aims to bring scientists and other top talents to help China make breakthroughs in key technologies and/or enhance China's high-tech industries.

Dr. Streit currently serves as distinguished professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering and Chair of the Materials Science and Engineering Department at the University of California, Los Angeles. He is also Director of the UCLA Engineering Institute for Technology Advancement, where he helps capture multi-disciplinary research programs and promote faculty and student entrepreneurship. In this role he has helped launch over thirty companies using UCLA-developed technology.

In addition to the roles mentioned above, he was previously Vice President for Electronics and Sensors at Northrop Grumman Aerospace Systems and Vice President for Technical Development at Northrop Grumman Space Technology. He has served on multiple government advisory boards, including the Naval Studies Board Panel "Future of Naval Space Systems" and the U.S. Special Operations Command Standing Committee. He currently serves on the Committee of Visitors for the NSF ECCS Division and as Chair of the UCLA Research Innovation Task Force. He is a member of the National Academy of Engineering, is a Fellow of IEEE and AAAS, and has over 400 publications and conference presentations. He received his Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering from UCLA in 1986 and was the UCLA Engineering Alumnus of the Year in 2003.
